



# - My Favourite Team -

## Learning Focus

Students create a profile of their favourite football team to share and present to the class.

## **Sequence of Content**

# **Success Criteria**

Students create a 'Team Profile' of their favourite football team.

- 1. Key information may include:
  - Club name, nickname and colours
  - Date established or founded as a club and first year in the competition
  - Premierships
  - Current coach and captain

- Other information may include team records and significant achievements including famous coaches, players, Hall of Fame Inductees and player award winners (Brownlow Medals, Dally M winners).
- 3. Students are to explain why they barrack for this team including if there is a connection to the team their family or friends barrack for.

**Note:** Students are to present their 'Team Profile' in a short oral presentation and may also use their choice of digital resources and other online communication tools to record and present their information. Their 'Team Profile' may be posted on a class blog or a shared online learning forum used by the school or classroom teacher.

# Extension Activity

As a class, list the previous five premiership or championship winning teams in your selected football code (AFL, NRL or A-League).

- 1. Brainstorm what makes these teams successful and identify key strengths of each of these teams.
- 2. Are there common strengths across each of these teams?
- 3. Predict and discuss which teams you think will win this year's premiership or championship and the reasons why.

#### **Additional Teacher Notes and Resources**

Teachers can adapt and modify this lesson to support and extend the learning of individual students. Teachers can reduce or increase the information required including how to best model and scaffold this activity.



Teachers may wish to share with students the various children books written about football including the *AFL Footy Kid Series* by Lorraine Wilson. Re-written in 2015, these books contain information about each of the 18 AFL that could assist students with this activity.

Other books about Australian Rules for young readers are *Why I Love Footy* (2018) by Michael Wagner, *Speccy-tacular Footy Stories* (2018). This is a collection of AFL-themed short stories written by some of Australia's sportiest children's authors. Both are available through Penguin Books.

NRL great, Billy Slater and Patrick Loughlin published a four-book series based around the West Hill Ravens Under 11s footy team. Written in 2014, the titles of each book are; *Try Time, Banana Kick, Show and Go*, and *Chip and Chase*.
